NEWSLETTER

The Appalachian Search & Rescue Conference is being organized as a regional association to provide a search and rescue capability for this area; to offer a cooperative training program in subjects related to search and rescue, and to serve as a coordinating agency and source of information for all who are interested in outdoor search and rescue operations. ASRC is not equipped to, nor does it plan to perform any services now provided by rescue squads in urban and suburban areas.

Background

In 1972, John Oliphant of the Potomac Appalachian Trail Club organized its search and rescue committee. Several training missions were led by him and Reid Folsom in 1972-1973.

In the fall of 1973 Keith Conover and Gene Harrison began leading the search and rescue training sessions for both PATC and the University of Virginia Outing Club. Participants, some of whom provided assistance and supervision in training, included rescue squad members, cavers, rock climbers, senior girl scouts, outdoor survival school graduates, as well as seasoned hikers from areas and groups beyond metropolitan Washington. Consequently it was decided to form an over all organization to be incorporated as the Appalachian Search & Rescue Conference. ASRC has been in operation on an informal basis for several months. Its primary accomplishment thus far has been a schedule of monthly training sessions. In these sessions we have not only exchanged ideas but have had practical training in live searches, high-angle rescue techniques, orienteering and basic ropework.

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Training

I. SURVIVAL

- A. Outdoor Principles: A survey of basic survival principles, wilderness travel and safety.
- B. Map and Compass: An introduction to topographic maps, magnetic compasses, and their use.
- C. Backcountry Seminar: Practical training in wilderness travel.
- D. Orienteering: Advanced map and compass techniques.
- E. Advanced Outdoor Techniques: Winter principles; long-term survival.

II. MEDICAL

- A. Search and Rescue First Aid: First aid principles as applied in a wilderness context.
- B. Cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR).

III. SEARCH AND RESCUE

- A. Basic Search Techniques: Survey methods, scratch searches, line search, and principles.
- B. Basic Ropework: Rope handling, belays, rappels, ascending knots, slings, hardware and safety.
- C. Litter Handling: The Stokes wire basket litter, functions and uses.
- D. Intermediate Ropework: More rappels, different types of rope, more ascending.
- E. Advanced Ropework: Specialized equipment such as mechanical ascenders, self-rescue, anchors.
- F. Basic Technical Rigging: Rigging structures, A-frames.

IV. OPERATIONS

- A. Communications and Management: Theory and practice.
- B. Leadership Seminar.

It is not intended that rescue group members attend all the above classes; their purpose is to provide instruction in those areas in which members feel they need additional knowledge and practice.
