Annex P. ASRC Belaying Process and CallsCommands

The standard calls used by the litter captain, the belayer and others are shown below:

<u>Call</u>	Who Says It	<u>What It Means</u>
ON BELAY	<u>Litter</u> <u>Captain</u>	Indicate that the team is ready to climb. Note that this is not a question.
BELAY ON	<u>Belayer</u>	When the belay is set and the belayer is ready to belay. This also is not a question.
OFF BELAY	<u>Litter</u> <u>Captain</u>	The belay is no longer required. The belayer should never drop the belay until this call is given!
BELAY OFF	<u>Belayer</u>	Acknowledgement of litter captain's "off belay" call.
CLIMBING	<u>Litter</u> <u>Captain</u>	Indicate that he is about to begin moving. It can also be used after a momentary stop.
CLIMB AWAY	Belayer	Acknowledgement of climbing.
<u>UP ROPE</u>	<u>Litter</u> <u>Captain</u>	Indicates that there is too much slack in the belay rope.
SLACK	Litter Captain	Request slack in the belay rope.
PRELOAD	<u>Litter</u> <u>Captain</u>	Just before going over a steep pitch. The belayer holds tightly and the litter team loads the rope to take out all of the stretch.
DOWN SLOW	<u>Litter</u> <u>Captain</u>	Request for a slow descent.
DOWN FAST	Litter Captain	Request for a fast descent. Slow and fast are relative terms and will depend on the terrain.
STOP	<u>Anyone</u>	To request a stop for any reason.
HALFWAY	<u>Litter</u> <u>Captain</u>	Half the rope has been used.
TWO-OH	Belayer	Indicates that about 20 feet of rope remains and that the team must find a good place to stop.
BELOW! or ROCK!	Anyone	Indicates that something is falling. Take cover! Shield the patient! Below is a European call but is also used in the United States.
<u>FALLING!</u>	Anyone	Self-explanatory. A loud scream may follow if the person falling deems it appropriate.

The medic and the team leader should not be bearers, since they need to be free to check the patient and/or coordinate activities.
